



## Human rights, disarmament, and killer robots

Concerns are increasing over the potential impact of fully autonomous weapons also known as lethal autonomous weapons of 'killer robots.' Last month, nations discussed this emerging challenge at the Convention on Conventional Weapons (CCW), while this month the matter will be considered by the 26th session of the Human Rights Council at the United Nations in Geneva.

The UN Special Rapporteur on extrajudicial, summary or arbitrary executions, Professor Christof Heyns, is due to present his latest [report \(A -HRC-26-36\)](#) to the the Human Rights Council on 12 June recommending that the body "remain seized" with the issue of autonomous weapons systems and "make its voice heard as the international debate unfolds."

On behalf of the Campaign to Stop Killer Robots, the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom (WILPF) invites you to a briefing on the human rights and , disarmament implications of killer robots.

We hope that this briefing will be a useful opportunity for Geneva's human rights community to prepare for discussing the human rights implication of fully autonomous weapons.
